Berkshire Hills sits on 640 beautiful acres that includes Miller Pond, our 60-acre private lake that many would call the center of camp life. You cannot spend time in this beautiful space and not develop a spiritual connection to the natural environment.

Last summer our new standing paddle boards were the vehicle of choice for communing with nature. Campers paddle out to the end of the lake, lie back and take in their surroundings. As they paddle back to shore you can see how the beauty of it all has given them a special sense of calm. The outdoor experience at BHEC is a first for many of our campers and leads to a lifelong appreciation for nature and the world outside.







DEVELOPING THE NEXT GENERATION OF JEWISH YOUNG ADULTS

While our program is designed to reflect Jewish values, we welcome all children to camp and believe that the values we teach - respect, giving back, community, and charity - benefit everyone. We use the lens of Jewish teaching and the experience of group living to build a strong community that reflects traditional Jewish values.

Tikkun Olam, the concept of repairing the world through community service, is an essential element of the Berkshire Hills experience. Every Saturday morning all campers and staff take part in fun, age-appropriate community service projects. Last summer community service projects included card writing, jewelry making, gardening, trail clearing and participating in activities with the Senior Citizens in our Senior Program. Campers also went off site to help maintain Taconic State Park and assist special needs campers at nearby Camp Anne.



A TOP-NOTCH FACILITY FOR EVERYONE

Berkshire Hills has always served a diverse community. Many campers attend on full or partial scholarship while others come from families that can afford full tuition. All of our campers deserve a facility that they can be proud of. Over the last seven years Camp has done extensive renovation work. New docks, renovated tennis and basketball courts, a new baseball field, new shower houses, a treehouse and a wall of windows in the Rec Hall are just a few of the ways we have shown children that we are always improving, just as we hope they are always improving. New facilities improve camper engagement in specific areas and keep camp competitive so we can maintain the blend of family income levels that makes the Berkshire Hills program sustainable.
